## Newbs: Is she in? Anong oras babalik?

Andiyan po ba si Juliebeth?	– Is Juliebeth in?
Ay.. wala po.	– Oh.. she’s not here.
Anong oras po siya babalik?	– What time will she be back?
Hindi ko po alam. Baka bukas pa.	- I don’t know. Probably tomorrow.

### Tambay Talk:

Andiyan po ba si...?

### You can also say:

Andiyan po ba si nanay/mama? – Is mother there?  
Andiyan po ba si tatay/papa? – Is father there?  
Andiyan po ba si *pareng* \_\_\_\_? – Is pare \_\_\_\_\_ there? (Just plug in the name of a male friend)

### Let’s look at another phrase:

Anong oras po + (*phrase of your choice*)? = What time...?

Use the verb *kain* (to eat):

Anong oras po siya *kumain*? – What time did she eat?  
Anong oras po siya *kumakain*? – What time does she usually eat?  
Anong oras po siya *kakain*? – What time will she eat?

Your turn! Practice the phrase with the *um*-structured verb “*uwi*” (to return home)!
